Donald Castle announces for Ward 6 seat on City Council

The year 2019 is three days old but the 2019 election season is already heating up.

Donald J. Castle, a 52-yearold Lynn resident, has announced that he will be a candidate for the Ward 6 seat on the Lynn City Council. Castle said he will hold a campaign kickoff event on Friday, Jan. 25 at Hibernian Hall. He has unveiled the format for his campaign stickers that will be red and black, adorned appropriately with a "castle" in the left top corner.

The Ward 6 seat is being vacated by Peter Capano, who was inaugurated Wednesday as state representative.

Castle lived on Henry Avenue in his youth, attended Cobbet Elementary and Breed Junior High, and graduated from Lynn Classical in 1984. He grew up in a single-parent household (His father was killed by a drunk driver when his mother, Frances, was seven months pregnant). His

mother is a retired personnel director for the city of Lynn. He has one brother, Steve, a retired Lynn Police officer.

Castle graduated from UMass/ Boston with a degree in Political Science and holds a J.D. degree from Massachusetts School of Law. He became a probation officer in 2000 and is currently the assistant chief probation officer at Suffolk Superior Court, Bos-

Highlands resident Wendy Joseph is a history buff and she cares about the reputation of her community, and she is also active in her neighborhood and the city of Lynn.

She and her husband moved to Lynn 14 years, finding a house affordable to them in the upand-coming neighborhood, The Highland.

"Lynn basically saved me and my husband. We lived in Brighton 10 years before moving here. We looked in Dorchester, Jamaica Plan and Somerville. We were shocked and appalled at what our money could buy."

They found their home on Rockaway, an 11-room, 1905 Victorian Gambrel, she said.

"Then I started meeting their people in Lynn. I know all my neighbors. In 10 years in Brighton we didn't know one person," she said. "The welcome I got from this city, the things available, Lynn Woods, the coastline, and High Rock Tower - a favorite of mine."

A native of Bellingham, Joseph's passion for Lynn began over a decade ago when she started discovering her community its socio-economic diversity, immigrants new and old.

"It's a wonderful melting pot," she said. "I have a great love for history."

Joseph became an activist in Lynn in her own neighborhood and her desire to have city trees replaced after they had just been left with a stump. She called City Hall and offered to plant a Home Depot tree in front of her house.

"For years nothing happened," Joseph said. "Then all of a sudden there was a tree in front of my house and all up and down the street. It helped it so much. It changed my focus of getting something just for me. If you work on a wider basis it helps the whole community."

From there she got into grant writing and finding other ways to improve the city.

Two other areas Joseph is passionate about are the reading of Frederick Douglass' speech, mocking Congress for not understanding how the freedom July 4, celebrates did not apply to people of color. The speech is read on the evening of the Fourth of July fireworks, at High Rock Tower Park on Circuit Avenue. The event has drawn more than 600 people.

Douglass was a social reformer, orator, statesman, and author who wrote the book, "Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass," during the winter of 184445. He signed the last page with "Lynn, Mass., April 28, 1845."

Her other passion is the G.A.R. (Grand Army of the Republic) Hall on Andrew Street the center of Civil War history in Lynn.

Joseph and her husband learned that the house they lived in was built by a Civil War soldier. Earlier this year City Councill President Darren Cyr convened a committee to look into restoring the G.A.R. Hall and its contents. Currently she and others on the committee are working to raise \$8-\$10 million to restore the building and its contents.

EDITORIAL

SO FAR....SO GOOD

With the rush and hub-bub of the holiday season now over, we'll all be settling in for another long New England winter.

Up to this point, we have been fortunate. We have yet to feel the wrath of any truly wintry weather. A cold day here or there -- including a chilly Thanksgiving -- has not been hard to take. Indeed, the temperatures have been quite moderate since the Winter Solstice on Dec. 21, with the New Year's Day temperature rising into the mid-50s, making it quite a nice day for a walk or a run outside, despite the strong breeze.

However, we know that Mother Nature typically saves her best (or worst) for later in the season. In just the past few years, we had winter storm Nemo in February of 2013, the Snowmageddon winter of 2015 (in which there was no snow in December), and last year we had those crazy storms in early January and early March that knocked out power throughout the region and brought coastal flooding to places along our bayside areas that never had experienced it to that extent before.

The images of Boston Harbor flooding into the Seaport District and water pouring into the Aquarium T stop were something we never had seen in our entire lives as residents of this area -- and that includes the Blizzard of '78 and the No Name Storm of 1991. The highest-ever high tide (exceeding the Blizzard of '78) and the third-highest tide in Boston Harbor were recorded in those two storms last year.

As we are writing this, the 10-day forecast is pretty nice, especially considering that it is the first part of January. However, the models for the long-range forecast indicate that February will be colder, snowier, and stormier than usual in our part of the country.

But as any longtime New Englander knows, all that we can do is to take winter one day at a time and be grateful for the nice days when we get them. When it comes to the weather, especially in this era of climate change, we are at the mercy of the vicissitudes of Mother Nature.

We can hope for the best, but we must expect the worst.

Senior guard Pamela Gonzales received the tournament's MVP Award following a 9-point, 17-rebound performance in the championship game. Gonzalez's 17 rebounds are likely a tournament record for a guard.

Sophomore guard Nicolette D'Itria was named to the All-Tournament. D'Itria scored nine points in the final and played excellent defense. Olivia Matela led all scorers with 12 points, including a pair of three-pointers. Gabby Torres had two 3-pointers and eight points. Eighth-grade guard Yirsy Queliz was very impressive with seven points, all coming in the third quarter as St. Mary's built a 46-24 lead.

Playing an up-tempo game as Head Coach Jeff Newhall had strategized, the Spartans opened the game up in the second half and pulled away to a strong victory.

Newhall talked about his

Lynn Jets capture Christmas Tourney title

The Lynn Jets put together a dominating third period to overtake Essex Tech and claim an exciting 6-5 victory in their annual Christmas Tournament at the Connery Rink in Lynn.

The Jets' high-scoring No. 1 line of Andrew Patrie, John Di-Filippo produced six goals, led by Patrie's hat-trick performance. DiFillipo netted two goals and had three assists while Clougherty had one goal and three assists.

Goaltender Jack Gallant, who is in his second full season in net, played his best hockey over the final 25 minutes, making some key saves with the game on the line. He finished with 22 saves, aided by an excellent effort by defenseman Owen Downey.

"Jack made some unbelievable saves, especially one on the power play and another one down low that I thought was heading in to the net," said Coach Mike Roberts. "His effort late in the second period and in the third period just shows his character and his ability to give us a chance on any night." Roberts also singled out Downey for his performance in the wins over Swampscott and Essex Tech.

"Owen had a great tournament," said Roberts. "He probably logged 65-70 minutes between the two games. He's a stalwart and we're going to look for him on that blue line as a senior captain and to give Jack a little bit of confidence."

The Jets trailed by a 3-1 margin early in the second period when Gallant made a spectacular save to keep the Jets' momentum going.

"I thought that was a game-saving stop," said Clougherty. "If we go down 4-1, it would have made

"As a probation officer, I have a lot of experience in the substance use disorder continuum and how to help people and get them in to treatment," said Castle. "I made it my personal goal to understand this disease that is wrecking our cities and our neighborhoods."

Castle gained recognition locally for his role as one of the leaders in the effort against the construction of two middle schools in Lynn, one at McManus Field near Lynn Tech, and the other on Parkland Avenue, the neighborhood in which Castle is a resident. Residents voted against new schools' construction by a sizable margin.

"I'm running for council because I want to ensure open, transparent, and fair government," said Castle. "I want to expand the involvement of people, and that's what we did with the school vote. We were never against the schools. We were against the location and the process."

Castle said he is concerned about the city's

We had a three-year drought in this tournament, we hadn't won it since our freshman year, and it's good for our coach, too, to get it under his belt."

DiFillipo called the victory "a team effort." "Everyone is working well together and we came through at the end as a team, even though we were trailing all game," he said. "We hadn't won this tournament since freshman year, so it's good to have it back. The coaches got us where we needed to be.

Roberts said he is pleased with his team's rally from an 0-1-1 start to the season.

"The word of the day [in a 9-7 win over Swampscott in the semifinals] was resilient



leader and get my teammates the ball when they're open.


