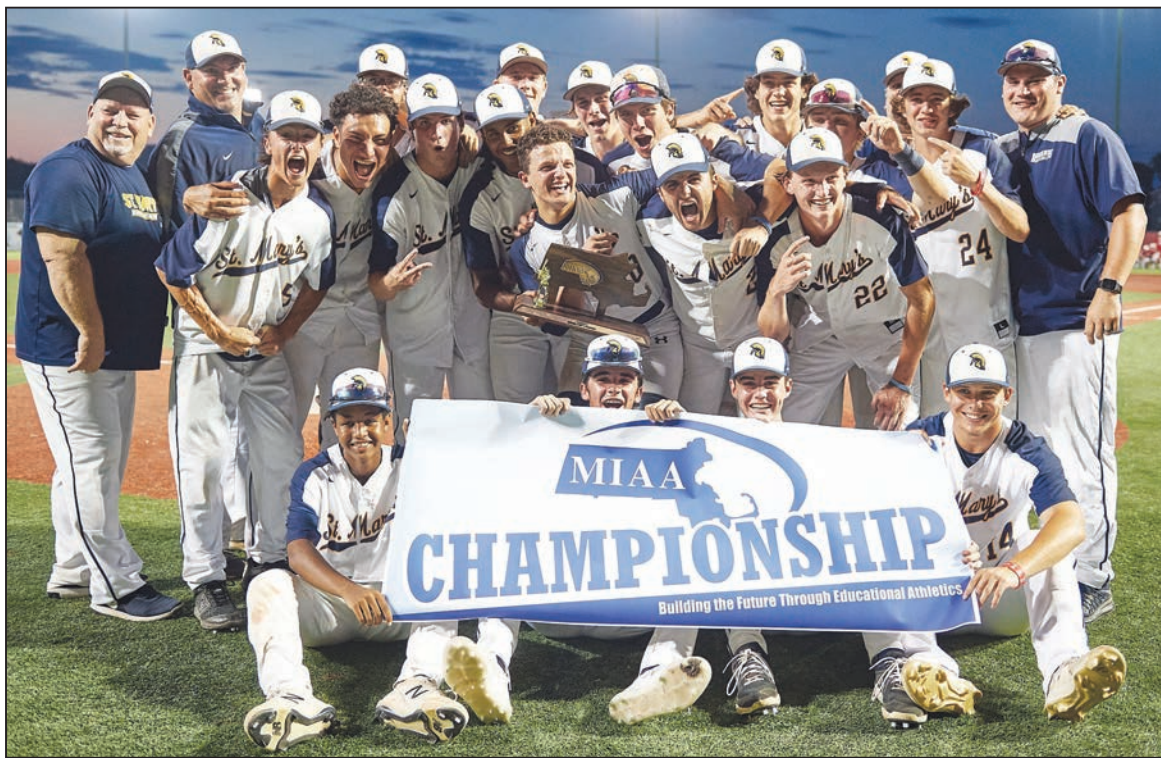

International Soccer Star

Lynn English goalkeeper Jack Mancaniello is making waves in Spain tournament

The news coming out of Spain is that Lynn English High School soccer star Jack Mancaniello is making a name for himself in an elite international soccer tournament featuring the top players in Europe.

"I'm just enjoying the experience I've had training with my team and playing in the games," said Mancaniello humbly in an interview with the Lynn Journal.

Lynn English soccer coach Kerry King understands why the international soccer scouts and opposing players have been impressed by Mancaniello's goalkeeping performances for the Rush North Shore contingent.

"This is a great opportunity for Jack because he checks all the boxes when you look for a dynamic goaltender," said King. "He's got great athleticism and he's got great size (6-feet-3, 160 pounds) and more importantly, he's got great desire to excel."

At age 16 and the youngest player on his team in the 18-under tournament, Mancaniello has been using his long reach, mobility, and quickness to his advantage to patrol the 8-foot-high and 24-foot-wide soccer net. College coaches are becoming aware of Mancaniello's emergence as a Division 1 prospect.

"The attention that Jack is getting in Spain is an unbelievable opportunity to expose himself to international soccer as well as the

best college programs around the country," said King. "I will tell you that Jack wants it more than anybody. This couldn't happen to a nicer kid or a more hard-working kid."

Mancaniello, who was fully vaccinated before the trip, is competing in Barcelona for the Rush North Shore contingent that plays in the Elite Development Program (EDP). Mancaniello has been the goalkeeper in games against national teams from Norway, Denmark, Italy, France, and Spain.

"I'm very confident in my abilities," said Jack prior to the trip. "I was called up to this team, so obviously they think I

City of Lynn receives upgraded bond rating

The City of Lynn bond rating recently was upgraded by the Standard & Poors Global Rating system from an A- rating when I took office in 2018, to an A rating with a positive outlook. This rating upgrade reflects years of hard work by the City of Lynn Financial team in partnership with the Mayor and the Lynn City Council to return Lynn to stable financial footing.

The S&P Global Ratings Report notes that the rating revision is reflective of the City's "ongoing positive operating results through the pandemic, supported by continued strengthening in its financial monitoring and budget development tools, leading to a growth in reserves." The City's reserve accounts have improved from \$1 million available in 2018 to nearly \$28 million available in 2021.

"I am extremely proud of the work we have done over the last 3 and a half years to get the City of Lynn in a more positive financial position," said Mayor Thomas M. McGee. "I want to thank our Chief Financial Officer Mi-

chael Bertino, our City Department Heads and the Lynn City Council for their efforts to collaborate and drastically improve the financial outlook for the City of Lynn. It has been a challenge to arrive where we are today, however I am hopeful that given our current position, we will be able to make some significant investments in capital projects such as building a new Pickering Middle School."

The City has made drastic progress to build back towards a balanced budget since borrowing \$14 million from the state in 2018 to cover operating expenses. Part of the immediate solution was hiring a full time CFO

and implementing a robust and collaborative multi-month budget process. Lynn has benefited from a growing tax base in recent years with investments in redevelopment of the downtown and the waterfront and the creation of a Capital Investment Plan (CIP) in 2019. The goal of the CIP is to address the City's infrastructure needs such as our schools and public buildings as well as investing in repairing roadways and sidewalks. The CIP will allow the City to perform long term financial planning, budget forecasting and identify the necessary improvement projects needed to improve the quality of life for Lynn residents.

Alcohol abuse is rampant in our country today, especially in the wake of the pandemic, and the Fourth unfortunately provides an opportunity -- which is to say, another excuse -- for those who have alcohol abuse issues to indulge way more than they should, especially when operating a boat or automobile.

It is the responsibility of each of us to ensure that the Fourth is enjoyed safely not only by ourselves, but by those we care about. If someone has had too much to drink, take their keys -- none of us wants to say to ourselves the next day, "If only I had not let them drive...."

As we emerge from the pandemic, we wish all of our readers an awesome -- and safe -- Fourth of July.

THE TRAGIC SHOOTING IN WINTHROP SHOWS ALL THAT IS WRONG IN AMERICA

The tragedy that struck the town of Winthrop on a quiet Saturday afternoon represents a confluence of everything that is wrong in America today.

The deranged, 28 year-old white gunman who shot two Black persons multiple times in cold blood on a residential sidewalk on an early-summer afternoon was motivated solely by one thing and one thing alone -- racial hatred.

He came across others on that same sidewalk who were white, but he did not threaten them. He saved his wrath -- and his bullets -- for two Black persons, 68 year-old Dave Green and 60 year-old Ramona Cooper, who were not connected to each other, but who only shared the same fate of being in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Racial animosity is nothing new in America, but incidents of race-based hate crimes have been on the upswing in recent years, not only as to persons of color, but also against the Asian, Latino, Muslim, and Jewish communities.

Fueling the increase in race-based violence is the easy accessibility to military-grade weaponry that is becoming omnipresent in our country, where there are almost as many guns as people. The Winthrop shooter had obtained a license to carry a firearm from another police department and was armed with multiple weapons, providing him with the firepower to carry out his murderous spree.

Social media is playing a huge role in the radicalization of white men such as the Winthrop shooter. Social media has opened the doorway to the ideology of white supremacist groups for disgruntled and mentally-unstable individuals. Although the shooter reportedly had a Ph.D and was married, neighbors described behavior that was not normal for a 28 year-old man.

Finally, the economic dislocation being caused by the huge degree of income inequality in our country has left many people in a state of despair, which manifests itself either in self-destructive drug abuse or socially-destructive acts of violence.

None of this is meant to excuse hateful behavior -- but it does provide an explanation for what is going wrong in America today.

The greatest threat to the safety of every American exists within our own country from white supremacist groups and individuals. Whether our nation is capable of facing up to the threat of these domestic terrorists will determine the fate of our democracy and our way of life.

Medical care, American Dream or Nightmare

Until recently my wife and I paid over \$2,000 a month for medical insurance. We each had a \$6,000 deductible. One year we both had procedure's which meant we had \$12,000 in out of pocket expenses. There were also some other "uncovered" medical costs throughout the year which resulted in over \$40,000 in medical insurance and out of pocket costs. The procedures themselves of course cost far and above what our out of pocket expenses were. Most likely if we had not had health insurance the doctors and medical facilities would not have performed them. In America, you have to have medical insurance or the means to cover the costs of your healthcare.

For the average American \$40,000 in medical costs in one year means an eternity of debt. The prospects of such makes average Americans shy away from medical care they need. Unaffordable medical care is not an American dream. Honestly, for too many Americans it's a nightmare.

A business owner recently told me, "I pay for insurance for my employees but it's barely enough insurance to meet the

legal requirements for our business. It's terrible insurance. It pays for almost nothing and no one with our insurance would ever want to go to the hospital." This is tragic as all Americans need good medical care. How-

ever, the insurance companies in America are making billions in profit. The way they make profit is by denying to pay for some-

thing you need. The health insurance industry had a "net" profit of 22 billion dollars in 2019. Businesses need to make profit, but Americans need medical care, not denial and medical debt that leads only to serious anxiety for Americans.

"If you are buying an ACA (Obamacare) plan as non-subsidized health insurance for a family of four, you can expect to pay about \$25,000 for the year in premiums and deductibles. That breaks down to an average of \$17,244 in annual premium cost for health insurance for families of 4 and \$7,767 in deductible ex-

penses. If you qualify for a subsidy this will certainly help but just the out of pocket deductible can make healthcare daunting for most." (ehealthinsurance.com)

Healthcare is a major component of financial security. Financial devastation is lurking around the corner for any American who does not have a good medical care safety net. Any hospital stay today amounts to tens of thousands of dollars.

You must make medical insurance a priority for you and your family. Also, our government is still a long way from solving our medical insurance dilemma.

Obamacare has not fixed our problem. It's a step but we have a long journey ahead of us. We must have access to good and affordable medical care in this country and we must not give up on making it good for all Americans.

can compete at this level. And I know that I have what it takes to perform well."

Jack, son of Lynn English Vice Principal Jennifer Mancaniello and Libby Mancaniello, credited Coach Kerry King for his advancement as a goalkeeper.

"I love Coach King - he's been there forever in my soccer career," said King. "He's a very good resource to have if you're trying to get to play at a higher level. And he's a great person, too."

King offered characteristic candor about Mancaniello's ex-

pected return to his Lynn English boys soccer team that rolled to a 14-0-2 record and the NEC championship in Jack's freshman season in net and reached the GBL Cup finals this spring.

"I hope Jack will be back for two more years unless someone plucks him from our program," said King. "I hope he stays and I know his mother would want him to stay, but with his trajectory you just never know. When you play internationally and compete at that level, there are also Academy teams like the Revolution Academy team. I'm just keeping my fingers crossed that Jack will be playing for English this fall."

There is another member of the Mancaniello family who is climbing the Lynn Youth Soccer ranks in impressive fashion. Jack's younger brother, Ryan, 9, is a rising star in the program.

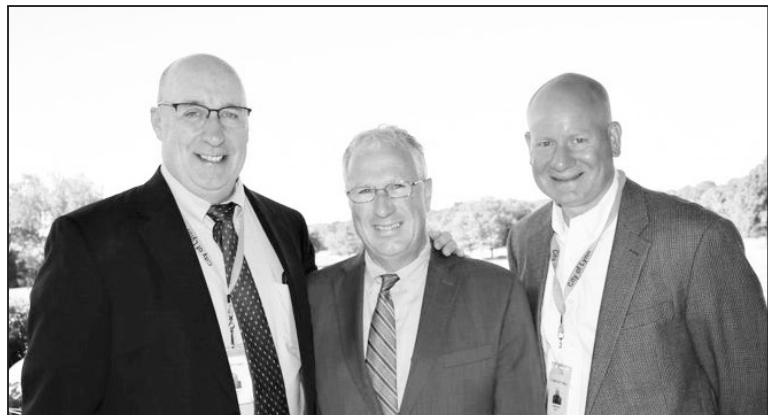

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THE ST. MARY'S SPARTANS WIN THE MIAA DIVISION 2 NORTH CHAMPIONSHIP

Terence Moynihan slammed a two-run triple into the right-centerfield gap, and freshman pitcher Eric Bridges twirled a four-hit masterpiece on the mound to lead the high-flying St. Mary's Spartans (19-6) to a 2-0 win over Masconomet to cop the MIAA Division 2 North championship Monday night at Frasier Field.

St. Mary's did all their offensive damage in the fifth inning. With the score 0-0, Andrew Luciano led off with a single. After Alven Cabral was hit by a pitch, Moynihan stepped up with the swing of the night, lacing a line drive that found the right-center gap as he legged it around the

bases to third, pushing Luciano and Cabral across the plate with all the runs the Spartans would need.

The Spartans entered the post-season as the sixth seed in the North Sectional and advanced to the final with wins over Greater Lawrence, Concord-Carlisle, and No. 2 seed North Andover.

Monday's win returns St. Mary's to the State Championship round, where they will face Hopkington in a rematch of the 2019 championship game that St. Mary's won. Time and venue had not been announced as of this writing.

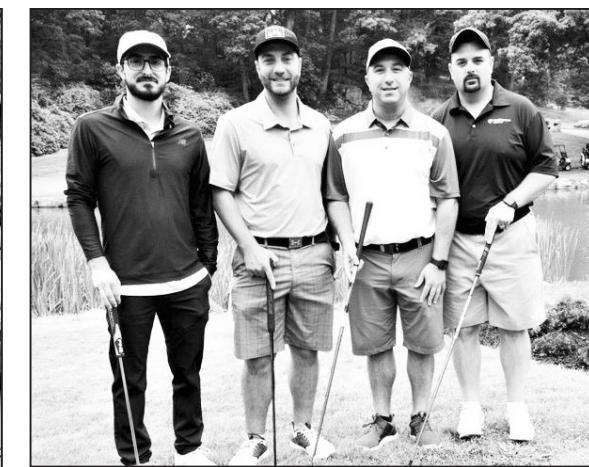

Breakdown of federal aid awarded to municipalities published

The Baker-Polito Administration last week announced that it has published a new, interactive online tool that displays a breakdown by municipality of the \$3.4 billion in direct federal aid awarded to local governments across Massachusetts by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). This direct aid to local governments is part of a total of \$8.7 billion awarded to Massachusetts through the new Coro-

navirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund, which was created by ARPA. This total also includes the \$5.3 billion awarded directly to the Commonwealth, and last week Governor Baker outlined a plan to spend \$2.8 billion of these funds on urgent priorities that support the communities hardest-hit by the pandemic.

These discretionary federal dollars are available to ev-

ery local city, town, and county throughout the Commonwealth to support urgent municipal COVID-19 response efforts, replace lost revenue, stabilize households and businesses, and address the existing disparities that the pandemic exacerbated.

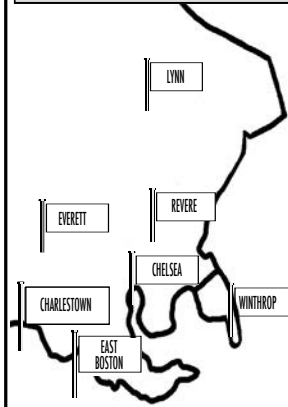
The new online resource consists of an interactive map that shows the breakdown of the \$3.4 billion that is available to local cities, towns, and counties

through the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund. The website also contains detailed information on funding allocations and the distribution process, as well as general information on the usage of these funds.

Last week, Gov. Charlie Baker outlined a plan to work with the Legislature to spend \$2.8 billion of the Commonwealth's discretionary funds on urgent priorities that support the com-

munities hardest-hit by the pandemic. These significant federal resources complement other funding received by municipalities throughout the course of the public health emergency, such as the \$502 million in Coronavirus Relief Fund dollars made available to municipal government entities earlier in the pandemic.

Cataldo Ambulance Service in Lynn is officially operating with a modern 10,000 square foot facility on Stetson Street. It houses two separate garages for its vehicles. One is for fleet operations maintenance for heavy truck capacity using hydraulic lifts and the adjacent one is for updating and cleaning the EMS vehicles for immediate response.

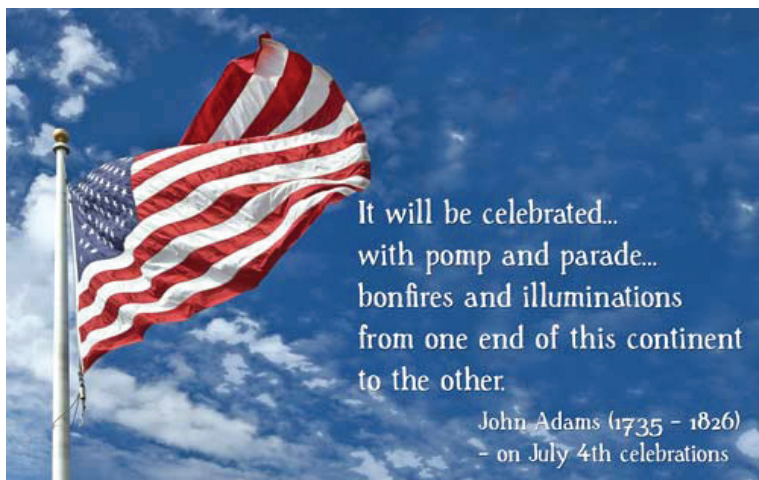
Chief Operating Officer Kevin Turner explained that it is a combination planning and a lot of work as he continued, "There was a need for a facility to handle our growing vehicle fleet. What this facility is going to do for us in Lynn is to allow us to service the vehicles ourselves without sending them out for major work. This facility will allow us to service not only our ambulances but other vehicles, such as Smart Care vehicles, Wheel-Chair Vans, Tango 2 Truck Incident Support Unit, and our buses"

President Dennis Cataldo thanks the City of Lynn for its support to establish this new maintenance facility. He said, "We can service 75 to 100 vehicles here. I wanted to showcase this new building and how we will continue to move in the right direction."

This new maintenance facility with lifts that were built to lift heavy tonnage vehicles and to be able to work underneath them is a need for the fleet operations. This facility will allow Cataldo Ambulance Service to support its municipal partners, handle most of the 911 calls, and have rapid responses time within six minutes.
