all work hard to achieve and are ready to move the City of Lynn forward in a new direction.



Lynn 8-U cheer team takes fifth at Nationals

The twenty athletes on the Lynn Rams 8-U cheer team will forever remember their first appearance in the American Youth Cheer (AYC) National Cheer Championships in Kissimmee, Florida.

The talented team, led by head coach Aleyah Bryant, assistant coach Natashaly Elwell, and team mom Ami Cashman, finished fifth in the tournament that brought together teams from across the country.

Bryant, who is in her second vear as head coach of the Rams. said her team earned its invitation to Florida by advancing from local and state competitions in Lowell and regionals in Providence.

After their success at regionals, the athletes and their families continued their season-long fundraising efforts that helped defray the expenses for their plane trips and hotel stay in Florida.

Once in Florida, the Lynn team had to make its way through the semifinals on Friday, Dec. 8. In an exciting atmosphere in a packed arena, the Lynn team performed a precise, well-choreographed, two-and-a-half-minute routine. "They did awesome," said Bryant. "We came in fourth place [Friday] and that allowed us to go to Super Sunday, where we placed fifth in the nation."

The Lynn 8-U team's accomplishment followed up on last year's team making it to regionals.

"It's been a great run," said Bryant, who previously coached in the Lynn Chargers organization before the merger with the Rams two years ago. "These girls are very talented. A lot of the

City invests \$2.2 million in affordable housing

In 2022, the City created the Affordable Housing Trust Fund (AHTF) and designated \$3 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to the trust. To date, more than \$2.2 million has been invested to increase affordable housing opportunities in Lynn.

The Affordable Housing Trust Fund has awarded:

• \$1.25 million to Preservation of Affordable Housing for pre-de-

velopment funding (\$75,000) and acquisition of the Olympia Square Apartments (\$1,175,000) to preserve affordability. POAH will be using the predevelopment funding to create 30-40 units of affordable housing on an adjacent parking lot, likely including at least 10 parking spaces on the ground floor and approximately 2,000 square feet of commercial space.

• \$509,000 to the Latino Support Network for a proposed project that will result in six income-restricted homeownership condominiums affordable to households earning up to 60 and 80 percent AMI.

• \$400,000 for a Housing Program Manager function over several years

• \$75,000 to the Commonwealth Land Trust for the Casa Project, a 36-unit development with eight units at or below 30 percent area median income (AMI) and the other 28 units at

EDITORIAL

DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. **NEVER GAVE UP**

For those of a certain age, it is hard to imagine that 2024 will mark 56 years since the assassination of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in Memphis while he was standing on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel on April 4, 1968. Recalling how we felt when he first heard the news of Dr. King's murder still brings chills and a deep sense of sadness that never has subsided.

For those who are too young to have been alive in that era of American history, there are a few things that everyone should know about Dr. King that should provide inspiration to all of us.

First, Dr. King was fearless. He knew from the inception of his rise to prominence of the Civil Rights movement that he would become a target for those who opposed change. Yet, even though he often told others that he believed his death would be imminent, he did not relent in his fight to continue his work in the civil rights movement.

Second, Dr. King stood for the rights of all Americans, not merely those of color. He was in Memphis working with striking sanitation workers, whose pay and working conditions he was seeking to help improve. He was an outspoken critic of the Vietnam War because he knew it to be an unjust war, not only for poor Americans who could not get a college deferment for the draft, but also for the people of Vietnam, whose homeland was being bombed into oblivion at great profit for the American military-industrial complex.

If Dr. King were alive in the present era, there is no doubt that he would have been in the forefront of the Black Lives Matter movement that has highlighted the ongoing racism and economic inequality that oppresses Americans of all races today.

Dr. King's words ring as true today as they did two generations ago; his "I Have A Dream" and "I've Been to the Mountaintop" speeches are among the most powerful not only in American history, but in all of Western civilization.

All of us should learn from the example set by Dr. King that in each of us is the power to change the world -- that each of us has the capacity to inspire others, whether through our words or deeds, whether on a small or large scale, to make the world a better place.

Many of our fellow citizens have followed the path set by Dr. King and many more will do so in the years ahead. So as we celebrate Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day this Monday, let us recall not only his memory and the many things that he accomplished, but let us also resolve never to give in to the forces of intolerance, prejudice, and hate that continue to plague our country and the world today.

REPLACE BELICHICK? GOOD LUCK WITH THAT!

As we are writing this at the beginning of the week, there is rampant speculation that the Patriots are going to fire Bill Belichick, who undeniably is the greatest football coach of all time.

Yes, he had a great quarterback in Tom Brady, but Belichick's genius was in taking players such as Brady (who, after all, was the 200th pick in the draft) and turning them into pros who could fill a niche (Teddy Bruschi, Julian Edelman, and Kevin Faulk being prime examples) on his teams. Belichick's Patriots were a classic case of the sum of the whole being greater than the sum of the parts in much the same way that Red Auerbach, another coaching genius, did for the Celtics.

Belichick's attention to detail was unparalleled, which explains why he routinely could allow great players to leave -- think Lawyer Milloy, Ty Law, Richard Seymour, Vince Wilfork, etc. -- and still be able to turn unheralded replacements into top-notch players.

To be sure, Bill Belichick wasn't perfect -- we still have never heard a logical explanation for why he did not play Malcolm Butler in that Super Bowl with Philly -- but when you look around at all of the so-called "new wave" of football coaches, there is a lot of mediocrity, and even the best are not in his league. (The only current coach who comes close to Belichick is an old school guy, Andy Reid of Kansas City.)

The Patriots need to rebuild and if there's anyone who knows how to do that, it is Bill Beliichick (although even he will have a hard time unless the Pats can draft a quarterback who can compete with Ryan Allen, Mahomes, Tua, Joe Burrow, Lamar Jackson, Justin Herbert, and C.J. Stroud).

Our prediction is this: If Belichick goes, whoever is his replacement will last about three years -- and the Pats and their fans will realize that there was only one Bill Belichick, the G.O.A.T.

or below 50 percent AMI.

"These are meaningful steps and the type of investment we envisioned when creating the Affordable Housing Trust Fund," said Mayor Jared C. Nicholson. "The projects funded thus far will not only add affordable units, but also maintain existing units, ensuring that residents can stay in their homes."

The City Council approved an ordinance in June of 2022 establishing the Affordable Housing Trust Fund, which, in tandem with an inclusionary zoning policy, is designed to provide the City tools to address the critical issue of housing affordability.'

"We are actively using this important tool to make meaningful investments to help members of our community gain and retain access to housing that is safe and affordable," said Nicholson, who thanked the members of the Affordable Housing Trust Fund board for their work on moving this initiative forward.

One of the recommendations that came out of the City's Housing Production Plan was to upgrade existing housing stock that could be accessible to current residents in neighborhoods throughout the City.

"The Affordable Housing Trust Fund is a tool that was looked upon favorably by residents who were involved in the Housing Production Plan process," said Charles Gaeta, executive director of the Lynn Housing Authority & Neighborhood Development. "Having the trust in place complements the work we are doing to increase affordable housing opportunities.'

In conjunction with the establishment of the Affordable Housing Trust, the City hired Sophia Yero as housing program manager. Yero, who holds a bachelor's and MBA from Florida Atlantic University, is charged with driving positive change through innovative housing solutions.

Boston nonprofit acquires senior affordable housing in Lynn

Preservation of Affordable Housing (POAH) has acquired Olympia Square Apartments, a 44-unit, 100% Section 8, fully occupied senior housing building in Lynn, just north of Boston. Formerly known as the Sweetser Block, the building was constructed in 1874 and originally housed a shoe manufacturing operation. The property was converted to apartments during the early 1980s and has two groundfloor commercial tenants.

With its convenient location in the center of downtown Lynn and just a short walk from an MBTA commuter-rail station, Olympia Square has always enjoyed high levels of occupancy but in recent years it suffered from deferred maintenance and the previous owner sought a preservation-minded buyer with the capacity to recapitalize it.

Olympia Square is home to a diverse and active group of seniors who love their building and community but wanted to see improvements. The renovations will include full window and roof replacement, life-safety and HVAC overhauls, and upgrades to apartment kitchens and bathrooms. The start of that work is targeted for late 2025.

"Creating new opportunities for affordable housing, and preserving long-term affordability of existing housing, are central components of CEDAC's mission. The acquisition and preservation of the Olympia Square Apartments in Lynn is a major accomplishment by POAH and will provide much needed affordable housing in the community," said Roger Herzog, Executive Director of the Community Economic Development Assistance Corporation (CEDAC).

"CEDAC was proud to partner with POAH and our participating lender, The Life Initiative, to provide critical acquisition financing that will help to advance the project's development and looks forward to continuing to work with them and other state and community partners as the project moves forward."

Lynn offers curbside composting

The Lynn Department of Public Works is partnering with Black Earth Compost, a full-service composting company, to offer curbside composting across the city. Composting is a process that recycles organic waste to become needed nutrients for soil and helps to divert food waste from trash.

Residents can register to receive a curbside bin along with compostable liners. Using the bin, households will collect compostable items including food scraps, soiled paper products, and certified compostable service ware. Residents can then schedule a recurring time for pick-up by Black Earth Compost.

In the spring, residents utilizing this service will receive a voucher for a cubic foot bag of compost as well as discounts on bulk compost and soil blends.

The first 100 people to register for the program will receive a free composting starter kit, which includes a bin and liners.

"We are pleased to make this program available to residents as we try to enhance the sustainability model throughout the city," said Mayor Jared C. Nicholson.

"This partnership with Black Earth Compost is a great first step toward limiting the amount of food waste in our trash," said Lisa Nerich, DPW associate commissioner. "We are hopeful that the residents of Lynn will participate in this program"


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DCR and Greenbelt announce conservation restriction on Lynn Woods, permanently protecting the park from development

The Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) and Greenbelt, Essex County's Land Trust (Greenbelt), today announced they have partnered to protect more than 2,000 acres of Lynn Woods, as part of a decades-long effort with the City of Lynn to permanently preserve the park and ensure it remains an important recreational resource for the region and a supplier of clean water for city residents. DCR and Greenbelt were gifted a conservation restriction on Lynn Woods Reservation by the City and the Lynn Water and Sewer Commission, who own and manage the land.

"At DCR, we have a tremendous opportunity to improve the health and happiness of our residents across Massachusetts by preserving access to beautiful parks around the state like Lynn Woods," said DCR Commissioner Brian Arrigo. "We are grateful to Mayor Nicholson, Greenbelt and the Friends of Lynn Woods for their partnership in ensuring this remarkable landscape is permanently protected from development and that it will serve as a source for recreation and clean water for the region for generations to come."

Restricting future development of our public lands is a commitment to safeguarding the natural splendor that defines our region and sustains the well-being of current and future generations."

"Lynn Woods is a treasure in our community, and we are committed to prioritizing preservation initiatives that support our outdoor recreation spaces," said City of Lynn Mayor Jared Nicholson. "Permanently conserving the Woods ensures that this space will continue to be enjoyed for generations."

"What a wonderful place Lynn Woods is - a huge, green treasure for the residents of Lynn and all of us in the region! In addition to all the benefits of its walking trails and water supplies, Lynn Woods is nature's air conditioner for the neighborhoods of Lynn," said Kate Bowditch, president of Greenbelt. "Greenbelt's analysis has identified Lynn Woods as the most valuable 'urban cooling' property in all of Essex County, and its permanent protection will mean those benefits will be there for future generations, who may need Lynn Woods even more than we do now."

"The forward-thinking Lynn residents who, one hundred and thirty years ago, donated their land and money to give us the Lynn Woods deserve to have their act of generosity remembered," said Jane Kelley, president of the Friends of Lynn Woods. "I can think of no better way to thank them then to preserve and protect their gift for future generations."

Lynn Woods was one of the first – and for a time the largest – municipal parks in the country. In 1870, the then Lynn Water

Board, now known as the Lynn Water and Sewer Commission, acquired the land that would become Breed's Pond following a destructive fire in the city the previous year. In 1889, Frederick Law Olmsted, the landscape architect behind Boston's Emerald Necklace, advised the City of Lynn that the site should be left undeveloped and preserved in its natural state for local residents to enjoy. In 1890, Lynn voters approved the creation of what was then the 998-acre Lynn Woods. The park, which stretches through Lynn, Saugus and Lynnfield, has since grown to the more than 2,100 acres it is today and includes more than 30 miles of trails for hiking, running, skiing, biking, and walking, as well as three water reservoirs.

Over the years, Lynn Woods Reservation has become an important place for those in the surrounding urban communities seeking open, green space, however, it faced threats of development over the years with proposals including a golf course and rerouting Route 95.

In 2001, the state acquired 40.5 acres of the reservation in Saugus to protect it from a threat of development on the shores of Walden Pond.

This conservation recreation – one of the state's largest – will now permanently protect the precious forestland from future development and ensure it continues to not only provide outdoor recreation, but also protects treasured natural, cultural and water resources for the public. As an urban park, the forestland also serves as an important resource in protecting area residents from the impacts of climate change.

The Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR), an agency of the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs, oversees 450,000 acres of parks and forests, beaches, bike trails, watersheds, dams, and parkways. Led by Commissioner Brian Arrigo, the agency's mission is to protect, promote, and enhance our common wealth of natural, cultural, and recreational resources. 

A dream season for Brisbon and her team

Arielle Brisbon has been to the National Cheer Championships as a head coach four consecutive times, but each trip has been very special.

In December, Brisbon's Lynn Rams Cheer 12-U took third place in the AYC Nationals in Kissimmee Florida, one year after her team finished top-5 in the nation. In 2021, the Rams 10-U cheerleaders were national champions. In 2019, her 8-U team were also national champions.

Interestingly, six of the eight girls on the 2019 team were member of this year's squad. As a sign of the growing popularity of the Lynn Rams cheer program, there were 27 girls on the 2023 team.

"They've won state titles every year, and three regional titles and one second-place," said Brisbon proudly.

Brisbon was a cheerleader herself in the East Lynn Pop Warner organization and made the varsity team at Lynn English High School, concluding her career a team captain, graduating in 2009.

Currently a certified medical assistant, Brisbon is also studying at North Shore Community College toward a nursing degree.

Despite her busy schedule, Brisbon not only coaches in the Lynn Rams program, but she is the director. Her daughter, Amiyah, is a member of the Lynn






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FREEZIN FOR A REASON CHARITY POLAR PLUNGE



The MBTA and Keolis are proud to announce the opening of temporary platforms located at Lynn Commuter Rail Station, nine months ahead of schedule.

The MBTA is pleased to resume Commuter Rail service to Lynn and reconnect communities and the public we serve through public transportation.
